Perhaps set aside some distractions, yes, but may we seek to support mercy and faithful love wherever we find it around us. However we can commit to that during Lent will be a wonderful discipline.

The traditional focus on sin, weakness, or darkness--as real and frustrating as these are--will not bring us to the beauty and mercy of Christ. To see, feel, and embrace Christ's unifying love all around us and within us will make us mindful of this love and fill us with joy. Christ is the center of Lent. May this year's holy observance increase our faithful love and joy. A blessed, hope-filled Lent to you all.
